Schedule Changes

Counselors are working with Grades 9-11 from November 11-December 13 to fill gaps and adjust second semester schedules. Please note that all schedules are tentative and therefore, students should view their schedule on Campus Portal the first day of second semester. Please note that counselors are not available during winter break. Once second semester begins, schedule changes are only approved for levels or being misplaced in a class (eg. English 10 to Honors English 10).

FAFSA

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) will open in December. College-bound seniors and their families are encouraged to complete the FAFSA. This awards federal grants, low-interest loans, and work study. The counseling website has several resources available to support families in submitting their FAFSA. In addition, Washburn University will be hosting FAFSA completion nights. Every college has a different FAFSA priority date. The Senior Letter includes the KBOR college deadlines. Speak to your college's financial aid office for additional information.





Students and directors learned from one of the most well-known professional choirs, as well as enjoyed performances from Chanticleer, the Kansas State University Concert Choir, and In-A-Chord A Cappella.

Chorale helped celebrate the retirement of popular choral lyricist Tony Silvestri with a combined performance with Washburn University and other local area high schools. Described as "the preeminent choral lyricist of our time," poet, author, composer, and speaker Charles Anthony Silvestri has worked with other artists from all over the world to create texts tailor-made for their commissions and specific artistic needs. He enjoys the challenge of solving these creative problems and has provided custom choral texts, opera libretti, program notes and other writing for composers including Eric Whitacre, Ola Gjeilo, Kim Arnesen, Christopher Tin, and Dan Forrest; and for ensembles ranging from high schools to the Houston Grand Opera, from the King's Singers to the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus, from Westminster Choir College to Westminster Abbey. As a clinician, Silvestri speaks to choirs, classes, and concert audiences about his works, the creative process, the marriage of words and music, and about his collaborative relationships with composers. He is the author of three books, and teaches Ancient and Medieval History at Washburn University and lives in Lawrence, KS.

This Generation performed at White Concert Hall for the annual Stacey Beaver scholarship concert. The concert is a fundraiser for the Stacie Beavers Scholarship fund through the Civic Music Club of Topeka, given to a Washburn University music student. Stacie Beavers, a member of the Civic Music Club for many years, passed away in 1978. The concert, co-sponsored by Washburn University, was attended by friends and families of the high school students, along with community members and Washburn music students.






Band

The Marching Band received Superior Ratings and a Trophy of Distinction at the Capital City Marching Festival at Washburn University. The Washburn University Music and Theatre Department hosted the annual Capital City Marching Band Festival Monday, October 7 in Yager Stadium. The festival featured approximately 1,000 students and their directors from nine Kansas high schools: Hayden Catholic High School, Junction City High School, Leavenworth High School, Seaman High School, Shawnee Heights High School, Topeka High School, Washburn Rural High School and Wichita West High School.

The Marching Band also received Superior Ratings at the Central States Marching Festival at Kansas State University. The K-State Bands' Central States Marching Festival has grown into the premier marching band festival in the state of Kansas and the region where over 40 bands performed.

Overall, they ranked in the top 24 Marching Bands in the State at the Kansas Bandmasters Marching Band Championship at Emporia State University. Congratulations to Mr. Chaffee, Ms. Casey, and Mr. Exum on a great season!



Cross Country

The Boys and Girls Cross Country teams recently finished out their seasons. The cross country teams brought home several championships this year. Both the Boys and Girls won City Titles and the Girls brought home a Centennial League title with Senior Rylee Ismert winning the individual title. The boys finished in 3rd place in both the League and Regional races qualifying the entire team to State. The Girls team won the Regional Meet and went on to take 2nd place at the State Meet.



Soccer

Career Clusters and Pathways at Washburn Rural

For the 2025-26 school year there will be a few changes in the Cluster/Pathways offered at WRHS. This information will be provided in the Course Planning Guide in January. The Kansas State Department of Education has completed the Cluster/Pathways reviews in order to align KS with the National Clusters and Pathways being offered.

A Career Cluster is a grouping of occupations and broad industries based on commonalities. The Career Clusters organize academic and occupational knowledge and skills into a coherent course sequence and identify pathways from secondary schools to two and four year colleges, graduate schools, and the workplace. Students learn in school about what they can do in the future. This connection to future goals motivates students to work harder and enroll in more rigorous courses.



CAREER READY STANDARDS: Are taught in all CTE Course work they are embedded within the overall competencies taught in each CTE class.

Featured Career Cluster Law, Public Safety, Correction and Security

Pathway: Corrections, Security, Law and Law Enforcement Services

Mission: To prepare students with the knowledge and skills necessary for continued education and, ultimately, a successful career in law, public safety, security, emergency services, police science, and/or fire science occupations.

The Law, Public Safety, Corrections, & Security Pathways of Study enable students:

- To obtain necessary skills through high quality classroom, laboratory, and field instruction
- To earn professional certifications required for employment
- To transition to postsecondary level institutions for additional education opportunities

Washburn University School of Law

On November 1st, 60 students in our Criminal Justice 1 & 2 classes along with the Business Law students attended a seminar and tour at Washburn University School of Law. The students were able to hear from Alex Glashausser, Professor; Andrew Stewart, Visiting Assistant Professor and Director of Academic Enrichment and Bar Readiness and Thomas Sneed-professor and Director of Law Library. The professors presented information about their backgrounds and roles at the University. They also talked about their personal journeys to law school.

WRHS students participated in panel discussion with Washburn Law Student Ambassadors who represented various stages of earning their Law Degree. The student ambassadors talked about their journey to law school, what it takes to be a law student and what steps high school students should be taking now. WRHS students were also allowed an opportunity to ask questions and the panel took turns answering the questions. Students were then broken into groups and went on a tour of the law school with an ambassador.

Blake Surey, from Ms. Reno's Business Law class said, "It was a good experience, the building was very impressive.

The classrooms and courtrooms were very nice and the ambassadors provided good insight to law school."

Business Presentation

On November 4, Kathy Reno's Business Law class got a kick start on their Property Law Unit in Business Law with a presentation from Kimberly and Josh Svaty. The Svaty's spoke to the class about many aspects of property law including intellectual property, easements, eminent domain, and energy property leasing.



Kimberly Svaty started Gencur Svaty Public Affairs in 2007 and her husband Josh joined the team in 2018 after serving many years in politics. They have vast experience in property law and specialize in energy related property issues.

Zach Inoles stated that, "I thought the presentation was very intriguing and they were very knowledgeable on all things property law.".



Career and College Preparation

Career Technical Education (CTE) is a valuable enhancement to traditional classroom learning. It allows students to gain knowledge and hands-on experience about specific career pathways. With an emphasis on helping students be prepared to be successful in high-wage, high-demand careers, Pathways are designed to move along a continuum of career awareness, career exploration, and career readiness. WRHS offers fifteen Career Pathways. Learn more at wrhs.net/cte

Work-based learning provides high school students with valuable hands-on experience and exposure to real-world work environments. By participating in job shadow experiences or internships, students have the opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills they learn in the classroom to practical situations. This practical experience helps students develop a deeper understanding of a career field, gain valuable industry-specific skills, and build professional networks. Work-based learning prepares high school students by equipping them with the necessary skills, knowledge, and confidence to succeed in the workforce after graduation.

This semester there are 17 WRHS students working in the community from the following pathways: Education, Agricultural, Finance, Marketing, and Health/BioMedical/BioChemistry. Workplace Experience is also offered "In-house" with our school businesses, Common Grounds, The Shack, WRHS Bank. Students are gaining real world experiences while operating the businesses here at school while working with our community partners.

WRHS offers Certificates and Industry Recognized Credentials in several pathways

<u>YouScience</u> is a valuable tool for classrooms that helps students explore their interests, skills, and potential career paths. It provides personalized assessments and career recommendations based on a student's aptitudes and interests. With YouScience, students can make more informed decisions about their future education and career choices, leading to greater engagement and success in the classroom.

NCCER, or the National Center for Construction Education and Research, offers industry-recognized credentials for high school students in construction-related fields. By participating in NCCER programs, high school students can gain valuable skills and knowledge that prepare them for careers in construction and related industries. NCCER certifications provide students with a competitive edge in the job market and open doors to a wide range of opportunities in the construction industry. Students are eligible to participate this semester.

The Culinary Arts students take the <u>ServSafe</u> Food Handler and Manager exams in the culinary course. These exams verify that a manager or person-in-charge has sufficient food safety knowledge to protect the public from food borne illness, ensures proper personal hygiene, prevents cross-contamination, controls time and temperature when handling food, and proper cleaning and sanitizing.

<u>Paraeducator Certificate</u> This Program offers statewide standards-based training for all paraeducators, and supports a career growth ladder that prepares students for employment as a paraeducator or moving forward with their post secondary plans in Education.

<u>Excel in CTE</u> was launched in 2012 as a plan to enhance career technical education in Kansas and better prepare high school students for college and careers. Kansas high school students qualify for state-funded college tuition in approved technical courses offered by Kansas technical and community colleges. WRHS students have the opportunity to attend <u>Washburn Tech</u> as part of their regular school day, or they may elect to take online courses outside of school hours.



Resources

Naviance, <u>Pathful</u>, and YouScience are resources available to all students and can help students explore career options, employment trends in those industries, and the training or education needed.

Community Partners

Advisory Committees assist in the development and operation of the CTE cluster/pathway by keeping instructors up to date on industry standards and trends. They also provide students the opportunity to build a professional network and may offer job shadow experiences or internships. 

Senior Portrait Specifications for Yearbook

The WRHS Yearbook staff encourages every senior to submit a senior portrait for the "People Section" of the yearbook. Portraits are due on/before the **first Friday in December.**

OPTION #1: Inter-State Studios

Inter-State is the school's portrait photographer. During enrollment & on retake dates seniors may take a senior portrait at no charge to the student. The yearbook staff will have access to these images.

OPTION #2: Select Your Photographer & Submit Your Image

Seniors complete this option on their own.

All images are sent electronically.

Please send the ORIGINAL (uncropped) file in JPEG format.

While most major photography studios in the area already have these specifications, please have your photographer send a digital file that matches the following:

- Head-and-shoulders shots are preferred.
- Attire must follow school handbook.
- Plain backgrounds preferred.
- No studio imprint (I.D.)/watermark on portrait.
- Photos must be vertical (or they will be cropped to fit a vertical space).
- Special note to photographers:
 Digital images must be 300 dpi. They can be submitted on CD or emailed to us at:

<u>Please note</u>: We will post a list of seniors who HAVE turned in portraits after the deadline. The list will be posted outside the Counseling Office and announcements will be made. **Seniors are responsible** for checking the list to make sure portraits have been delivered and received by the yearbook staff.

(3) Based on your layout selection, write the appropriate amount of text you'd like to appear in the salute space. (Please limit any quoted text to 4 lines or 10% of original material. No song lyrics will be printed.)

AFJROTC

November was Veterans month and AFJROTC staff and students celebrated our nation's heroes by hosting an event in the WRHS Activity Center for our entire student population and over 100 veterans. The ceremony was broadcast over YouTube where the combined efforts of our AFJROTC, band and choir were showcased. We marched downtown in the Topeka Veterans Day parade with cadets Micheal Leonard and Aidyn Robinson taking part in a joint color guard featuring cadets from all four Topeka JROTCs. We also performed color guards for events at multiple elementary schools and performed honor guard duty at the Gage Park Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

November also marked the beginning of marching drill competition season with The City Drill Meet. This year the meet was hosted by Topeka West high school. Our cadets performed admirably with our new cadet drill team taking second place overall. We also took four of the top ten Individual Drill awards with Evan Garcia finishing 2nd, Kelcie Schneider 4th, Mariah McDonald 7th and Aidyn Robinson in 8th place.

And finally, our marksmanship team which began the season 0-2 has since rallied, winning all four of our matches this month. Moving forward, we will have our unity inspection on December 4th and we will participate in Topeka West's first ever drill meet as they host 15 teams from Iowa, Kansas, and MIssouri.

Environmental Club

Environmental Club Creates Monarch Waystation

The Environmental Club repurposed a neglected landscaping bed at the west staff entrance to create a native plant garden. The garden is now an official monarch waystation, part of an international program to support the endangered monarch butterfly. The garden includes plants like swamp milkweed, coreopsis, and native grasses that provide food and shelter for monarchs during their migration. This fall, the garden hosted approximately 20 monarch caterpillars and one chrysalis. The garden will be expanded further in the spring.







The project was made possible by a generous donation from the Topeka Zoo, which supplied all plants and mulch for free. Club members cleared out weeds and dying plants to prepare the bed and installed the new plants together.

The Monarch Waystation Program started at the University of Kansas, the program has grown to include almost 50,000 waystations across the country, and there are also some international sites. These waystations provide crucial habitats for migrating monarchs.

Monarch populations have decreased by 85% in the last 20 years due to habitat loss, pesticide use, and climate change. Waystations like the one at WRHS are vital in protecting and restoring monarch habitats. The Environmental Club will continue expanding the garden in the spring, supporting monarchs and other pollinators further.

The Environmental Club meets in room E342 on club days (Mrs. Raugewitz's room - sponsor). Future plans include expanding the monarch garden, clearing invasive species from the cross country trail, and collaborating with KAY Club on a houseplant program. We welcome participation by anyone who would like to join in our efforts to make WRHS a more environmentally sustainable campus.
